SYLLABUS: WHOLE AND HOLY – EXPLORING THE HUMAN PERSON IN BIBLICAL THEOLOGY

A 6-Week Bible Study Series

Purpose:

To explore what it means to be human according to Scripture, examining the nature of body, soul, and spirit through the lens of biblical anthropology and theological reflection. This study engages key views (trichotomy, dichotomy, and naturalism), while grounding identity in the *imago Dei*—the image of God—both as ontology and vocation.

Week 1: What Are We? - Body, Soul, and Spirit in Scripture

Key Texts: Genesis 2:7, 1 Thessalonians 5:23, Hebrews 4:12

Focus: Overview of trichotomy, dichotomy, and naturalism in light of biblical language

Concepts: Nephesh, Ruach, Psyche, Pneuma, Biblical anthropology

Week 2: Trichotomy and the Image of God

Key Texts: Genesis 1:26–27, Colossians 1:15, 1 Corinthians 15:44

Focus: The human spirit, soul, and body in relation to Christ and the *imago Dei* **Concepts:** Ontology and function, spiritual capacity, resurrection identity

Week 3: Living in the Image – Purpose and Vocation

Key Texts: Psalm 8, 2 Corinthians 3:18, Ephesians 4:24

Focus: Reflecting God's character and fulfilling His purpose as image-bearers

Concepts: Stewardship, moral agency, identity, dignity, creativity

Week 4: The Soul in Scripture and Discipleship

Key Texts: Matthew 10:28, Luke 1:46–47, Romans 12:1–2

Focus: The soul's role in reasoning, emotion, will, and sanctification **Concepts:** Transformation, renewal, mental health and theology

Week 5: Spirit and Communion with God

Key Texts: Romans 8:16, John 4:24, Ecclesiastes 12:7

Focus: The spirit's role in worship, divine communion, and eternal destiny

Concepts: Spiritual birth, regeneration, prayer, discernment

Week 6: Challenges from Naturalism and the Path to Wholeness

Key Texts: Colossians 1:17, Acts 17:28, Psalm 139:13–16

Focus: Responding to naturalism, materialism, and secular anthropology

Concepts: Human worth, consciousness, philosophical zombies, trinitarian anthropology

Each session includes:

Scriptural exploration and theological reflection

- Discussion questions and group engagement
- Weekly devotional or prayer focus
- Definitions of key Hebrew and Greek terms
- Application to identity, spiritual formation, and cultural engagement
