### **Bible Example:**

• John 3:16: God loves everyone and gives everyone the opportunity for eternal life.

### **Questions People Ask:**

• Does this make God less powerful because He doesn't control who believes in Him?

### ARMINIANISM

### What It Teaches:

- God gives everyone a kind of grace that allows them to choose Him. God knows what we'll do, but He doesn't force us.
- Salvation depends on God's foreknowledge of who will choose to follow Him.

### **Bible Example:**

• 1 Timothy 2:4: God wants everyone to be saved.

# **Questions People Ask:**

• If God knows everything in advance, does that mean our decisions are already determined?

# CALVINISM

### What It Teaches:

- God is completely in charge. He chooses who will be saved, and those people will definitely believe.
- People make choices, but even our desires are part of God's plan.

### **Bible Example:**

• Romans 8:29-30: God knows and chooses people ahead of time to be saved.

### **Questions People Ask:**

• If God controls everything, is He responsible for the bad things people do?

### MOLINISM

### What It Teaches:

- God knows every possible choice we could make in any situation. Using this knowledge, He created a world where His plans succeed, and we still have real freedom.
- It's like God knew every "what if" and used that to shape history.

### **Bible Example:**

• Genesis 50:20: God turned Joseph's suffering into something good, even though people meant it for harm.

#### **Questions People Ask:**

• Is this idea too complicated, or does it solve the problem well?

#### **OPEN THEISM**

#### What It Teaches:

• God knows all possibilities but doesn't know every future choice people will make.

He works with our decisions in real time.

• The future is open and unfolds as we make choices.

#### **Bible Example:**

• Isaiah 46:10: Some say this shows God can accomplish His goals even if He doesn't know every detail in advance.

#### **Questions People Ask:**

• Can God really be in control if He doesn't know the future completely?

### WHY MOLINISM STANDS OUT

#### What Makes It Unique:

 Molinism tries to explain how God can be fully in control while also giving us real choices. God uses His middle knowledge (knowing what we would do in any situation) to make His plans work out.

### **Big Question:**

• Why would God create people who won't choose Him? Because the actions of those who reject Him might inspire others to seek Him. Removing them could stop someone else from finding faith. It's all connected.

#### **Personal Reflections:**

- God's love isn't forced. Real love requires real choices. Even though it's painful when people reject God, the possibility of real love makes it worth it.
- Our choices are meaningful, and God's plan is still good, even if it's hard to understand.
